Bash at the Beach 1996 would change the game forever, as Hulk Hogan would come down to the ring, supposedly to save Team WCW from the mischievous and destructive "Outsiders", only to leg drop a destroyed Randy Savage multiple times, turning his back on the promotion, the fans, and millions watching at home, instantly creating the hottest sensation professional wrestling has ever seen, perhaps only second to Hulkamania itself.

And what a perfect time to place a stat update, eh? Fuck starting things on January 1st, and calling it a yearly stat-update. Yeah, it's yearly, but it's fucking at such a random point of time. Scenarios are meant and should be placed at pivotal points in wrestling history, where a user would want to begin their own story and do things their own way.

This scenario will give you the opportunity to take over the nWo right from the beginning. Just Hogan, Nash, and Hall. No Bischoff yet, no Giant, no "Crow" Sting, no injured Flair. Just a clean slate for your mind to put its imagination to work ...

You'll can also be in control of the beginnings of the WWF Attitude Era, when "Stone Cold" Steve Austin was just in his infancy, and Shawn Michaels and Bret Hart were to begin perhaps the biggest feud of their entire careers ...

Or head to Philadelphia, PA, where Extreme Championship Wrestling has just begun to make a name for itself with his cutting edge product, variety of wrestling styles, wonderful display of tits and ass, and the best collection of independent workers throughout the United States ...

World Championship Wrestling

Global; Atlanta, GA; Traditional Pro Wrestling

Beginning on August 1996, WCW was the hottest thing in professional wrestling since the explosion of Hulkamania in the mid-80's. The company could easily thank one man, but it's recent success with the its "New World Order" storyline is due to the thoughtful actions and execution by men such as Scott Hall, Kevin Nash, and Eric Bischoff, not just Hollywood Hulk Hogan, now the biggest heel in all of wrestling.

July 7th, 1996 is a day to be remembered for the rest of wrestling history, as WCW hosted its Bash at the Beach event, and completely shocked the wrestling world. The invading "Outsiders", the team of Hall and Nash, would confuse and distort much of what was happening in World Championship Wrestling to an extent, but would surely turn the tables for good in the night's main event. A three-man tag-team match put The Outsiders in the line of fire of Lex Luger, Randy Savage, and Sting, representing the WCW organization and perhaps all which was good in the world.

The third man for the Outsiders had not been revealed, leading to much speculation up to the match, and certainly throughout the contest. As "Macho Man" represented the last beacon of hope for the WCW team, a harmonious applause would rush through the Ocean Center in Dayton Beach, FL, as their hero Hulk Hogan would march his way down to the ring, with his eyes fixated on his opponent. But after the Outsiders took to ironically, the outside portion of the ring, fans would watch as their favorite wrestler of all time, the biggest name in professional wrestling ...

Hulk Hogan, would turn his back on the traditions of professional wrestling and the millions of Hulkamaniacs who, and delivered the leg drop heard around the world.

"Mean Gene, the first think you need to do is to tell these people to shut up if you want to hear what I got to say. The first thing you got to realize, brother, is that

this is the future of wrestling. You can call this the New World Order of wrestling, brother!"

Heading into August, World Championship Wrestling has been in upheaval. One of the franchise faces of professional wrestling was ready to sink WCW to the depths of hell, while every other roster member is just trying to hold on. The New World Order, now with their leader Hollywood Hogan, were now even more methodical and ruthless in their actions on Nitro, including a complete annihilation of the WCW roster while backstage during the July 29th edition of WCW Monday Nitro, creating nothing but mass confusion and hysteria related to how far the nWo will go, and who anyone can trust. Were there more members of the nWo waiting to turn on the roster and the fans? Did World Championship Wrestling have the star power to prevent the nWo from completely taking control of things?

These questions ... are up to you!

Allow yourself to take control of WCW right after the formation of the new World order ... It's been less than a month, and you are now in control of the most famous wrestling faction in history, and are only at the tip of the iceberg, which would provide WCW its highest peak, lowest of lows, and eventual dissolution ...

Heading into WCW Hog Wild, the booking committee has already built up heat between Hollywood Hulk Hogan, and the WCW World Heavyweight champion, The Giant. With the formation of the nWo, The Giant alongside Jimmy Hart have been forced to go from the most feared wrestler/manager combination on the roster, to one of the few who have the power and ability to stand up for World Championship Wrestling ... Will The Giant fail in his endeavors to protect the WCW World Heavyweight title, or will WCW continue to stand tall another day?

----> Match comes to a screeching halt after **Jimmy Hart** runs out to the ring and grabs the attention of not only the camera-men, but the wrestlers in the ring. After screaming his heart out trying to get the WCW to head backstage, **Kevin Nash** and **Scott Hall** are found delivering their most vicious beat down yet, including baseball bat shots to **Arn Anderson** and throwing poor **Rey Misterio Jr.** face first into a trailer situated on concrete. All six men head backstage and help out as EMT's and the rest of

the roster arrives, all while the New World Order get away scotch free. Continued madness and mass grieving would continue throughout the rest show ...

By the beginning of August 1996, Vince McMahon was ready to hit the panic button. His only competition, and one which had been reaching new levels of success year-after-year, had just pulled the biggest turn in wrestling history, and now had the hottest commodity in all of professional wrestling. The numbers were turning on McMahon as well, as *WWF Monday Night Raw* ratings were dropping well below to the 2.0 mark, and had a

lot of trouble getting above the 3.0 invisible ceiling. WCW Monday Nitro, on the other hand, had climbed themselves from the 2.0-floor in May of '96, and were now reaching into the mid-3.0's following Bash in the Beach '96. Reality would show Nitro eventually blowing out Raw by the end of August '96, but there's still time to turn things around for the WWF!

As World Championship Wrestling began to look more cutting edge throughout the weeks, the World Wrestling Federation was falling behind, and were barely able to keep up with the changing face of wrestling. Sure, edgy stars such as Shawn Michaels and The Undertaker were headlining PPV's, and they still had perhaps the biggest face in all of wrestling, Bret Hart; but below the stars were nothing but poor wrestlers and out-of-whack characters.

Perhaps the saving grace of WWF lies in one man? The man who would go on to win the *1996 King of the Ring* tournament on June 23rd, 1996, and soon after would proclaim ...

" You sit there and you thump your Bible, and you say your prayers, and it didn't get you anywhere! Talk about your psalms, talk about John 3:16... Austin 3:16 says I just whipped your ass!"

- Steve Austin, King of the Ring 1996

There is no debate that the attitude adjustment in "Stone Cold" Steve Austin would trigger and lead the complete change in attitude of the WWF, who would go on to present perhaps the best product professional wrestling has ever seen, an era affectionately referred to as the WWF Attitude Era. It was this period of workers, storylines, and matches which would allow WWF to eventually overtake WCW in the long run, and proceeding to buyout Ted Turner's baby for a considerably cheap sum of money ...

This is your opportunity to do just that. Take the World Wrestling Federation from the beginning of the Attitude Era, and turn WCW from the hottest thing in wrestling to a product dominated by stars way past their prime ...

As the WWF chugged along into August 1996, the promotion had spent their time building up SummerSlam matches between the likes of Goldust and Marc Mero, to Sycho Sid and the British Bulldog, as well as a WWF Heavyweight championship match-up between the title holder, Shawn Michaels, and the humungous, big bad, number one contender, Vader, led alongside by the very smart but absolutely obnoxious, James E. Cornette ...

-----> **The Undertaker** would leave the match near the end as **Mankind** would come out to ringside, eventually running backstage where the Undertaker would proceed to stalk him.
